Personal statement regarding the I have a dream: a world without racism.

First I want to say how grateful I am to be part of this group. I had the privilege and pleasure to work with Peggy, Skipp and Sharon on drafting a proposed letter to the Archbishop and to the wonderful Bishop Bruce Lewandowski.

I have gone through periods in my life when I myself had racist attitudes toward individuals of color who I felt had betrayed me or hurt me. A few are as follows:

- 1. Being called white trash and thrown out of an African American woman's back yard when my friend and I took her African American boyfriend's cousin home from college classes. It was hurtful to me as I was anything but trash. Also, the woman did not recognize me at the time, but she was a sales clerk who I had many nice conversations with at her store.
- 2. Being denied by my African American coworkers and having to ask for a black armband to wear at work when Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated.
- 3. Armed robbed violently on our porch and in the hallway by two African American males and having the one the police caught found not guilty by a jury. The biggest problem I had with this incident is that one of the armed robbers hurt my dear husband, and we had to go to the ER.

I have tried to steer myself away from feelings of racial discrimination and am at a point in my life where I am going to do what Jesus would do. I am not going to claim white privilege, nor am I going to shame or blame others who struggle as I did.

Also, I am an attorney who has seen and fought against racial discrimination in the workplace through the EEOC and in the courts. I cannot do my job with integrity unless I am true to myself and continue to believe in and fight against systemic racism.

My parents Ken and Fran Berger were beloved very active members of St. V parish. I want to be part of the good work St V does for others.
